Section A

Answer Question 01.

Extract A

Progressives were concerned with the whole spectrum of abuses, inconsistencies and social problems facing the United States. These were related to poverty, disease, the concentration of economic power in a few hands and the industrial cycle of boom and slump. They were particularly concerned about political corruption, conservation of natural resources, slum conditions, crime, child labour, impure food, and vice, especially in the great cities. 5

The first president to be markedly influenced by Progressive ideas was Theodore Roosevelt, and he was a leader of dynamic quality. He managed, in the Hepburn Act of 1906, to get the Interstate Commerce Commission established with effective control over railroad rates, thus setting a pattern of continuing Federal administrative regulation in other areas. 10

Extract B

What did most to create a climate favourable to Progressivism were the revelations of a group of journalists known as muckrakers. There had been earlier reports of social and economic evils, but what distinguished the muckrakers was that they reached a mass audience through cheap popular magazines. McClure's was the example of the muckraking magazine. In 1902 a series of articles by Lincoln Steffens, "The Shame of the Cities", disclosed widespread corruption in American cities. This was followed by Ida M Tarbell's "History of the Standard Oil Company" a carefully documented assault on John D Rockefeller and his business methods. They and the authors of muckraking novels like Upton Sinclair's *The Jungle* undoubtedly helped stir the American conscience. 5
