- (b) Translate lines 2–4 (*Anchisa generate ... fallere numen*). [5]
- (c) *haec omnis ... unda sepulti* (lines 5–6): what groups are contrasted here? [2]
- (d) *centum errant ... litora circum* (line 9): what do they do for 100 years? [1]
- (e) *constitit Anchisa ... miseratus iniquam* (lines 11–12):
- (i) what emotion is Aeneas feeling here? [1]
- (ii) why is he feeling this? [1]
- (f) *cernit ibi ... navemque virosque* (lines 13–16): how does Virgil make this an interesting piece of writing? You should refer to **both** what he says **and** how he says it. [4]

- (c) *nam tua ... nomen habebit* (lines 6–9): how will Palinurus be remembered? [2]
- (d) Write out and scan line 11 (*corde ... terra*), marking the long and short syllables and divisions between the feet. [2]
- (e) Translate lines 13–15 (*navita quos ... increpat ultro*). [5]
- (f) *quisquis es ... comprime gressum* (lines 16–17): how does Virgil make the *navita* seem unwelcoming? Make **one** point quoting the relevant Latin in your answer. [2]

- (b) Translate lines 2–4 (*omnia superioris ... quid exspectant*). [5]
- (c) *hi quid ... non putet* (lines 4–7): how does Cicero use the techniques of an orator in these lines? Make **two** points, quoting the Latin in your answer. [4]
- (d) *non est ... vesperam consequentur* (lines 7–10):
- (i) which Latin word shows that Cicero is taking the situation seriously? [1]
 - (ii) what does Cicero want the conspirators to do? [2]
 - (iii) how does he help them to do it? [1]

5 Read the following passage and answer the questions:

- (c) *sed si ... intellegere possumus* (lines 3–6): how does Cicero make his words here persuasive? Make **two** points, quoting the Latin in your answer. [4]
- (d) Translate lines 6–9 (*nunc illos ... etiam volo*). [5]
- (e) *monitos* (line 8): why is this course of action towards Catiline’s supporters so important to Cicero? [1]
