Quadratic Equation

For the equation $ax^2 + bx + c = 0$,

 $x = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a} \cdot$

Binomial Theorem

$$(a+b)^{n} = a^{n} + \binom{n}{1}a^{n-1}b + \binom{n}{2}a^{n-2}b^{2} + \dots + \binom{n}{r}a^{n-r}b^{r} + \dots + b^{n}$$

where *n* is a positive integer and $\binom{n}{r} = \frac{n!}{(n-r)!r!}$.

Identities

$$\sin^2 A + \cos^2 A = 1.$$

$$\csc^2 A = 1 + \cot^2 A.$$


Formulae for $\triangle ABC$






