## Mathematical Formulae

## 1. ALGEBRA

## Quadratic Equation

For the equation $a x^{2}+b x+c=0$,

$$
x=\frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^{2}-4 a c}}{2 a} .
$$

Binomial Theorem

$$
(a+b)^{n}=a^{n}+\binom{n}{1} a^{n-1} b+\binom{n}{2} a^{n-2} b^{2}+\ldots+\binom{n}{r} a^{n-r} b^{r}+\ldots+b^{n},
$$

where $n$ is a positive integer and $\binom{n}{r}=\frac{n!}{(n-r)!r!}$.

## 2. TRIGONOMETRY

Identities

$$
\begin{gathered}
\sin ^{2} A+\cos ^{2} A=1 \\
\sec ^{2} A=1+\tan ^{2} A \\
\operatorname{cosec}^{2} A=1+\cot ^{2} A
\end{gathered}

Formulae for $\triangle A B C$

\frac{a}{\sin A}=\frac{b}{\sin B}=\frac{c}{\sin C} \\
a^{2}=b^{2}+c^{2}-2 b c \cos A \\

1 Find the coordinates of the stationary point on the curve $y=x^{2}+\frac{16}{x}$.

2 (a) On the axes below, sketch the curve $y=3 \cos 2 x-1$ for $0^{\circ} \leqslant x \leqslant 180^{\circ}$.

(b) (i) State the amplitude of $1-4 \sin 2 x$.
(ii) State the period of $5 \tan 3 x+1$.

3 A curve is such that $\frac{\mathrm{d} y}{\mathrm{~d} x}=\frac{2}{\sqrt{x+3}}$ for $x>-3$. The curve passes through the point $(6,10)$.
(i) Find the equation of the curve.
(ii) Find the $x$-coordinate of the point on the curve where $y=6$.

4 (i) Using the substitution $y=5^{x}$, show that the equation $5^{2 x+1}-5^{x+1}+2=2\left(5^{x}\right) \quad$ can be written in the form $a y^{2}+b y+2=0$, where $a$ and $b$ are constants to be found.
(ii) Hence solve the equation $5^{2 x+1}-5^{x+1}+2=2\left(5^{x}\right)$.

5 (i) Find the equation of the tangent to the curve $y=x^{3}-\ln x \quad$ at the point on the curve where $x=1$.
(ii) Show that this tangent bisects the line joining the points $(-2,16)$ and $(12,2)$.

6 (i) Given that the coefficient of $x^{2}$ in the expansion of $(2+p x)^{6}$ is 60 , find the value of the positive constant $p$.
(ii) Using your value of $p$, find the coefficient of $x^{2}$ in the expansion of $(3-x)(2+p x)^{6}$.

7 Matrices $\mathbf{A}$ and $\mathbf{B}$ are such that $\mathbf{A}=\left(\begin{array}{cc}3 a & 2 b \\ -a & b\end{array}\right)$ and $\mathbf{B}=\left(\begin{array}{cc}-a & b \\ 2 a & 2 b\end{array}\right)$, where $a$ and $b$ are non-zero constants. (i) Find $\mathbf{A}^{-1}$.
(ii) Using your answer to part (i), find the matrix $\mathbf{X}$ such that $\mathbf{X A}=\mathbf{B}$.

8 The point $P$ lies on the line joining $A(-2,3)$ and $B(10,19)$ such that $A P: P B=1: 3$.
(i) Show that the $x$-coordinate of $P$ is 1 and find the $y$-coordinate of $P$.
(ii) Find the equation of the line through $P$ which is perpendicular to $A B$.

The line through $P$ which is perpendicular to $A B$ meets the $y$-axis at the point $Q$.
(iii) Find the area of the triangle $A Q B$.

9 The table shows experimental values of variables $x$ and $y$.

| $x$ | 2 | 2.5 | 3 | 3.5 | 4 |
| :---: | :---: | :---: | :---: | :---: | :---: |
| $y$ | 18.8 | 29.6 | 46.9 | 74.1 | 117.2 |

(i) By plotting a suitable straight line graph on the grid below, show that $x$ and $y$ are related by the equation $y=a b^{x}$, where $a$ and $b$ are constants.

(ii) Use your graph to find the value of $a$ and of $b$.

10 (a) (i) Find how many different 4-digit numbers can be formed using the digits 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 if no digit is repeated.
(ii) How many of the 4-digit numbers found in part (i) are greater than 6000 ?
(iii) How many of the 4-digit numbers found in part (i) are greater than 6000 and are odd?
(b) A quiz team of 10 players is to be chosen from a class of 8 boys and 12 girls.
(i) Find the number of different teams that can be chosen if the team has to have equal numbers of girls and boys.
(ii) Find the number of different teams that can be chosen if the team has to include the youngest and oldest boy and the youngest and oldest girl.

11 (a) Solve $2 \cos 3 x=\cot 3 x$ for $0^{\circ} \leqslant x \leqslant 90^{\circ}$.
(b) Solve $\sec \left(y+\frac{\pi}{2}\right)=-2$ for $0 \leqslant y \leqslant \pi$ radians.


The position vectors of points $A$ and $B$ relative to an origin $O$ are $\mathbf{a}$ and $\mathbf{b}$ respectively. The point $P$ is such that $\overrightarrow{O P}=\mu \overrightarrow{O A}$. The point $Q$ is such that $\overrightarrow{O Q}=\lambda \overrightarrow{O B}$. The lines $A Q$ and $B P$ intersect at the point $R$.
(i) Express $\overrightarrow{A Q}$ in terms of $\lambda$, $\mathbf{a}$ and $\mathbf{b}$.
(ii) Express $\overrightarrow{B P}$ in terms of $\mu, \mathbf{a}$ and $\mathbf{b}$.

It is given that $3 \overrightarrow{A R}=\overrightarrow{A Q}$ and $8 \overrightarrow{B R}=7 \overrightarrow{B P}$.
(iii) Express $\overrightarrow{O R}$ in terms of $\lambda$, a and $\mathbf{b}$.
(iv) Express $\overrightarrow{O R}$ in terms of $\mu$, a and $\mathbf{b}$.
(v) Hence find the value of $\mu$ and of $\lambda$.

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
