## Mathematical Formulae

## 1. ALGEBRA

## Quadratic Equation

For the equation $a x^{2}+b x+c=0$,

$$
x=\frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^{2}-4 a c}}{2 a}
$$

Binomial Theorem

$$
(a+b)^{n}=a^{n}+\binom{n}{1} a^{n-1} b+\binom{n}{2} a^{n-2} b^{2}+\ldots+\binom{n}{r} a^{n-r} b^{r}+\ldots+b^{n},
$$

where $n$ is a positive integer and $\binom{n}{r}=\frac{n!}{(n-r)!r!}$

## 2. TRIGONOMETRY

Identities

$$
\begin{gathered}
\sin ^{2} A+\cos ^{2} A=1 \\
\sec ^{2} A=1+\tan ^{2} A \\
\operatorname{cosec}^{2} A=1+\cot ^{2} A
\end{gathered}
$$

Formulae for $\triangle A B C$

$$
\begin{gathered}
\frac{a}{\sin A}=\frac{b}{\sin B}=\frac{c}{\sin C} \\
a^{2}=b^{2}+c^{2}-2 b c \cos A \\
\Delta=\frac{1}{2} b c \sin A
\end{gathered}
$$

1 The remainder obtained when the polynomial $\mathrm{p}(x)=x^{3}+a x^{2}-3 x+b$ is divided by $x+3$ is twice the remainder obtained when $\mathrm{p}(x)$ is divided by $x-2$. Given also that $\mathrm{p}(x)$ is divisible by $x+1$, find the value of $a$ and of $b$.

2 A curve has equation $y=4+5 \sin 3 x$.
(i) Find $\frac{\mathrm{d} y}{\mathrm{~d} x}$.
(ii) Hence find the equation of the tangent to the curve $y=4+5 \sin 3 x$ at the point where $x=\frac{\pi}{3}$.

## 3 Do not use a calculator in this question.

(a) Simplify $\frac{(3+2 \sqrt{5})(6-2 \sqrt{5})}{(4-\sqrt{5})}$, giving your answer in the form $a+b \sqrt{5}$, where $a$ and $b$ are integers.
(b) In this part, all lengths are in centimetres.


The diagram shows the triangle $A B C$ with $A B=6-2 \sqrt{3}$ and $B C=6+2 \sqrt{3}$. Given that $\cos A B C=-\frac{1}{2}$, find the length of $A C$ in the form $c \sqrt{d}$, where $c$ and $d$ are integers.

4 It is given that $y=\frac{\ln \left(4 x^{2}-1\right)}{x+2}$.
(i) Find the values of $x$ for which $y$ is not defined.
(ii) Find $\frac{\mathrm{d} y}{\mathrm{~d} x}$.
(iii) Hence find the approximate increase in $y$ when $x$ increases from 2 to $2+h$, where $h$ is small.

5 The first 3 terms in the expansion of $(2+a x)^{n}$ are equal to $1024-1280 x+b x^{2}$, where $n, a$ and $b$ are constants.
(i) Find the value of each of $n, a$ and $b$.
(ii) Hence find the term independent of $x$ in the expansion of $(2+a x)^{n}\left(x-\frac{1}{x}\right)^{2}$.


The diagram shows the quadrilateral $O A B C$ such that $\overrightarrow{O A}=\mathbf{a}, \overrightarrow{O B}=\mathbf{b}$ and $\overrightarrow{O C}=\mathbf{c}$. It is given that $A M: M C=2: 1$ and $O M: M B=3: 2$.
(i) Find $\overrightarrow{A C}$ in terms of $\mathbf{a}$ and $\mathbf{c}$.
(ii) Find $\overrightarrow{O M}$ in terms of $\mathbf{a}$ and $\mathbf{c}$.
(iii) Find $\overrightarrow{O M}$ in terms of $\mathbf{b}$.
(iv) Find $5 \mathbf{a}+10 \mathbf{c}$ in terms of $\mathbf{b}$.
(v) Find $\overrightarrow{A B}$ in terms of $\mathbf{a}$ and $\mathbf{c}$, giving your answer in its simplest form.

7 (a) Find the values of $a$ for which $\quad \operatorname{det}\left(\begin{array}{ll}2 a & 1 \\ 4 a & a\end{array}\right)=6-3 a$.
(b) It is given that $\mathbf{A}=\left(\begin{array}{ll}2 & 1 \\ 3 & 4\end{array}\right)$ and $\mathbf{B}=\left(\begin{array}{rr}2 & 0 \\ -3 & 5\end{array}\right)$.
(i) Find $\mathbf{A}^{-1}$.
(ii) Hence find the matrix $\mathbf{C}$ such that $\mathbf{A C}=\mathbf{B}$.
(c) Find the $2 \times 2$ matrix $\mathbf{D}$ such that $4 \mathbf{D}+3 \mathbf{I}=\mathbf{O}$.

8 A particle $P$, moving in a straight line, passes through a fixed point $O$ at time $t=0 \mathrm{~s}$. At time $t \mathrm{~s}$ after leaving $O$, the displacement of the particle is $x \mathrm{~m}$ and its velocity is $v \mathrm{~ms}^{-1}$, where $v=12 \mathrm{e}^{2 t}-48 t, t \geqslant 0$.
(i) Find $x$ in terms of $t$.
(ii) Find the value of $t$ when the acceleration of $P$ is zero.
(iii) Find the velocity of $P$ when the acceleration is zero.

9 The table shows values of the variables $x$ and $y$.

| $x$ | 2 | 4 | 6 | 8 | 10 |
| :---: | :---: | :---: | :---: | :---: | :---: |
| $y$ | 736 | 271 | 100 | 37 | 13 |

The relationship between $x$ and $y$ is thought to be of the form $y=A \mathrm{e}^{b x}$, where $A$ and $b$ are constants.
(i) Transform this relationship into straight line form.
(ii) Hence, by plotting a suitable graph, show that the relationship $y=A \mathrm{e}^{b x}$ is correct.

(iii) Use your graph to find the value of $A$ and of $b$.
(iv) Estimate the value of $x$ when $y=500$.
(v) Estimate the value of $y$ when $x=5$.


The diagram shows the graph of $y=(x+2)^{2}(1-3 x)$. The curve has a minimum at the point $A$, a maximum at the point $B$ and intersects the $y$-axis and the $x$-axis at the points $C$ and $D$ respectively.
(i) Find the $x$-coordinate of $A$ and of $B$.
(ii) Write down the coordinates of $C$ and of $D$.
(iii) Showing all your working, find the area of the shaded region.

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
