Instructions for preparing apparatus

These instructions detail the apparatus, reagents and specimens required by each candidate for each experiment in this paper. A summary of the questions that will be presented to the candidates is included, where appropriate, to allow the teacher to test the apparatus appropriately. **No access is permitted to the question paper in advance of the examination session.**

It is assumed that the ordinary apparatus of a science laboratory will be available, including a supply of purified water (distilled or deionised).

If arrangements are made for different sessions for different groups of candidates, care must be taken to ensure that the different groups of candidates are effectively isolated so that **no information passes between them.**

All specimens should carry only the code letters and numbers as indicated and their identity should not be revealed to the candidates.

Supervisors should ensure that all specimens have the correct identity attached to the specimen and that these are **not** removed during the examination.

If a candidate breaks any of the apparatus, or loses any of the material supplied, the matter should be rectified and a note made in the Supervisor's Report.

Supervisors are advised to remind candidates that **all** substances in the examination should be treated with caution. Only those tests described in the Question Paper should be attempted. Pipette fillers and safety goggles should be used where necessary.

In accordance with COSHH (Control of Substances Hazardous to Health) Regulations, operative in the UK, a hazard appraisal of the examination has been carried out.

The following codes are used where relevant.

C = corrosive substance	F = highly flammable substance
H = harmful or irritating substance	O = oxidising substance
T = toxic substance	N = harmful to the environment

The attention of Centres is drawn to any local regulations relating to safety, first-aid and disposal of chemicals.

'Hazard Data Sheets', relating to materials used in this examination, should be available from your chemical supplier.

The Supervisor should make sure the Supervisor's Report is fully completed and a copy is enclosed with each packet of scripts.

For Question 1

Each candidate will require

(i) 50 cm³ yeast and sugar suspension, labelled **yeast**

The yeast and sugar suspension can be made by dissolving 2.5g sugar in 50 cm^3 warm water then adding 2.5g fresh dried yeast and mixing well. This should be prepared 30 minutes before the examination and kept at $35 \,^{\circ}$ C.

- (ii) access to ice, hot and cold water (e.g. kettle and cold tap)
- (iii) a 25 cm³ measuring cylinder
- (iv) 2 thermometers (range 0 to 100 °C, with 1 °C divisions)
- (v) 2 beakers of about 400 cm³. These should be of similar height to the test-tubes
- (vi) a means of labelling the beakers
- (vii) a stirring rod
- (viii) a stopclock or a timer on which candidates can easily read minutes
- (ix) a 30 cm rule with a mm scale
- (x) a 10 cm^3 syringe without the needle (a dropping pipette could be used if none available)
- (xi) 2 large test-tubes (approx. 150 mm x 24 mm).
- **Note:** 20 cm³ of the yeast and sugar suspension when placed in a large test-tube kept at 35 °C should produce at least 4 cm foam in 10 minutes. This should be tested prior to the examination and adjustments made as necessary, by increasing (or decreasing) ratios of yeast and sugar as appropriate.

For Question 2

Each candidate will require

- (i) homogeneous mixture of the solids copper carbonate, CuCO₃, zinc sulfate, ZnSO₄, and manganese(IV) oxide, MnO₂, in the approximate mass ratio 2 : 2 : 1, labelled **Q** (allow each candidate 2.5 g)
- [H] (ii) approximately 45 cm³ 0.4 mol dm⁻³ sodium hydroxide, NaOH labelled dilute sodium hydroxide
 - (iii) approximately 25 cm³ 2.0 mol dm⁻³ aqueous ammonia, NH₃ labelled **ammonia solution**
- [H] (iv) approximately 30 cm³ 2.0 mol dm⁻³ hydrochloric acid, HC*l* labelled dilute hydrochloric acid
 - (v) a supply of distilled water
 - (vi) a 25 cm³ measuring cylinder
 - (vii) 2 small beakers
 - (viii) a filter funnel and at least two filter papers
 - (ix) 3 test-tubes (approx. 125 mm x 15 mm)
 - (x) 2 large test-tubes (approx. 150 mm x 24 mm)
 - (xi) a means of holding a test-tube
 - (xii) a stirring rod
 - (xiii) a tripod and gauze
 - (xiv) Bunsen burner and a means to light it.

Centres may provide fewer test-tubes, the minimum being 2 test-tubes (125 mm x 15 mm) and 1 large test-tube (150 mm x 24 mm). If this is the case, candidates will have to rinse test-tubes with distilled water which must be provided.

For Question 3

Each candidate will require

- (i) power source of approximately 1.5–2.0 V. Where candidates are supplied with a power source of variable voltage output, the voltage should be set by the supervisor and taped
- (ii) a voltmeter capable of measuring the supply voltage with a minimum precision of 0.1V
- (iii) an ammeter capable of measuring up to 1.0 A with a minimum precision of 0.05 A
- (iv) a switch which may be an integral part of the power supply
- (v) approximately 105 cm of straight, bare constantan wire of diameter 0.31 mm (30 swg) or 0.27 mm (32 swg), taped to a metre rule at two places (between the 0 and 5 cm mark and between the 95 cm and 100 cm mark). The zero end of the wire must be labelled X, the other end, Y
- (vi) two suitable terminals (e.g. crocodile clips) attached to the constantan wire at ends X and Y of the metre rule, so that the power supply, switch and ammeter can be connected to the resistance wire
- (vii) a sliding contact labelled C. This may be a crocodile clip connected to a lead.

Notes:

1. The circuit shown in Fig. 3.1 must be set up for candidates.

2. At changeover, check that the circuit is still connected correctly. If cells are used, check that they are adequately charged.

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Spare materials and equipment should be available and can be provided without penalty. **Candidates should be made aware of this.**

Information required from the Supervisor:

The Supervisor is asked to carry out the experiments and to enter the results on a spare copy of the examination paper, clearly marked 'Supervisor's Results' and showing the Centre number. This should be done, out of sight of the candidates, using the same solutions, reagents, specimens and apparatus as the candidates.

A copy of the 'Supervisor's Results' should be returned with each packet of scripts. Failure to do so may cause the candidates to be penalised.

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This form must be completed and returned in the envelope with the scripts together with the seating plan and the Supervisor's Results as mentioned on page 6.

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General

The Supervisor is invited to give details of any difficulties experienced by particular candidates giving their names and candidate numbers. These should include reference to:

- (a) difficulties due to faulty apparatus;
- (b) accidents to apparatus or materials;
- (c) physical handicaps, e.g. short sight, colour blindness;
- (d) any other information that is likely to assist the Examiner, especially if this cannot be discovered in the scripts;
- (e) any help given to a candidate.

The Supervisor is asked to supply the following information:

Plan of work benches, giving details by candidate numbers of the places occupied by the candidates for each session and a copy of the 'Supervisor's Results'.
