- Or** (b) In what ways, and with what effects, do the *Selected Poems* present female characters and voices? You should refer in your answer to **two** or **three** poems or sections of longer poems.

PHILIP LARKIN: *Selected Poetry*

- 2 **Either** (a) 'More optimistic than they seem at first'.

How far is this your view of Larkin's poems in this selection? You may refer to **two** or **three** poems in your answer or range more widely.

- Or** (b) Discuss some of the ways Larkin's poetry explores ideas about work.

You should refer to **two** or **three** poems in your answer.

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SECTION B
PROSE

Answer **one** question from this section.

- 3** **Either** (a) Consider the importance of chance and coincidence in the novel's structure.
Or (b) Discuss the presentation and significance of vanity in *Persuasion*.

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
