Answer all questions in this section.	Marks Remark
You are a cross-platform reporter who works for <i>News 24</i> , a national public service broadcast company. You cover the Grantonshire area (population 200,000) in the north of England and write for the local radio station <i>Grantonshire 24 FM</i> . However, if a story is newsworthy enough, you write for its national online service as well.	
(a) Spend 35 minutes completing the tasks (i) and (ii) which follow the situation outlined below.	
It is 1pm and you are in the office when you receive a phone call from a contact, Ted Berker, who is a councillor on Granton County Council. The area he represents includes the affluent village of Cotesville. He says there appears to be a police raid in progress at the home of one of the village's richest families. Cotesville House is a Grade II listed manor house where the Davery family live. The family's land also includes a twelve hundred acre farm, farm buildings and a popular farm shop and restaurant called The Cotesville. The farm supplies organic produce nationwide under the company name of Davery Farm.	
Councillor Berker tells you dozens of police are searching the house and outbuildings. He also says he's had phone calls from members of the public who were eating in the restaurant when a man, speaking a foreign language, and bleeding from a bad cut on his head, staggered into the restaurant and collapsed. He says: "The woman who phoned me said the poor bloke was nothing but skin and bone and that he was wearing overalls with the Davery Farm logo. I always knew that Davery lot was up to no good. It'd be just like them to be starving their workers to death to save a few bob."	
You phone Granton Police and are told that the inspector will call you back. When Inspector Graham Todd returns your call he confirms his officers are currently involved in an operation at Cotesville House, Cotesville, investigating allegations of trafficking for labour exploitation – or modern slavery. He confirms that ten police officers, including two forensics officers, are involved in the operation. He says that Richard Davery, the Chief Executive of Davery Farm, and his wife Jennifer, are currently being interviewed by officers. He also confirms that a 28-year-old Lithuanian man suffering from head injuries was taken by ambulance from the farm to Granton hospital, where he remains in a serious but stable condition.

(b) At 2pm you are called to a press conference held by Granton Police.

Spend 30 minutes completing this task.

Write a script of **240 words** for a **radio news package report**. This report will be broadcast at 5pm. You may use any of the information you have received on the story so far. All quotations count as available audio. No cue is required.

Additional information

Inspector Graham Todd informs the press conference that the police operation began at 11.15 am when Granton Police received a call from a member of the public who had been having morning coffee at The Cotesville. He says: "A table of ladies from Granton Women's Institute were meeting at the restaurant when the injured man appeared in the middle of the room. Apparently, at first diners thought he was drunk, and a waiter tried to remove him. But when he collapsed it was clear he was seriously injured."

He tells the conference that one of the women was formerly a nurse and she was able to administer first aid to the man, while the ambulance was called. The police were also informed and a unit of two officers was dispatched to the restaurant at 11.30 am. Inspector Todd says: "When the officers arrived the injured man was being moved into the ambulance. He saw their uniforms and he became distressed and began shouting for help."

The conference is informed that one of the police officers was Latvian and was able to understand some of what the man was saying. This led to police searching a locked outbuilding on the other side of the farm from the manor house and restaurant. There they found 20 other men, of different nationalities, in a poor state of health, living in filthy conditions.

Inspector Graham Todd says: "The men were locked inside a barn-like structure. There was no electricity and no windows in the building. There was one cold water tap outside the property, and a portable toilet had been erected alongside the barn. It was overflowing. From what we could see, 20 men appeared to be living in a space designed for sheep."

He says the men have been checked over by doctors. All are severely undernourished, and one has a chest infection. The men have been moved to appropriate accommodation while they are interviewed by police.

Inspector Todd says: "We believe the men have been trafficked from various eastern European countries, but we need to carry out full interviews with all of them before we can establish whether a crime has been committed here in the UK."

He confirms that Mr and Mrs Davery are continuing to assist police with their inquiries.

Also at the press conference is Aleksy Bukoski, from the Granton branch
of the charity Rights of the Migrant. He states that some of the men are
Polish and he has been able to speak to them.

He says: "The conditions these men were living in were barbaric. They've been rescued from slavery, that's what it is." He explains that three of the men told him they each paid 500 Euro to a man who said he was an agent for Davery Farm, and would bring them to Grantonshire for work. But when they arrived they were told the arrangement had changed, and the charge was actually five *thousand* Euro each. "They have been working seven days a week for the last six months, to pay off this supposed 'debt'," he says.

He adds: "The lack of work in many eastern European countries means the job of traffickers is made easier. People like these men, who don't speak English, and don't know their rights, have nowhere to turn to in situations like this."

He calls on the public not to turn a blind eye if they think they are witnessing modern day slavery. "The British government estimates there are between ten and thirteen thousand people in forced labour in the UK. Please contact myself or the police if you have any suspicions. We can only stop the work of these evil traffickers if we have evidence," he says.

The list of **8 stories** below is available for today's bulletin on the broadcaster's flagship station. The bulletin will air at **6pm**.

Spend **10 minutes** completing this **task**.

Read the following 8 stories. Select the **top 3 stories** you think would appeal most to the listeners. Then write the opening **15 seconds** of the **news bulletin script**, headlining the top 3 stories that you have selected. (3 words per second).

Story 1:

A training academy could be set up by Aberystwyth council in Wales to train apprentices to work on three multimillion pound building projects in the area. A total of £700m is being spent on new homes, education facilities and recycling and waste management facilities over the next five years. It is hoped the schemes could create 300 jobs and 100 apprenticeships in the area.

Story 2:

Twenty-one British schoolchildren have been injured after a coach was in a collision involving a lorry in Switzerland. The coach was carrying 40 schoolchildren and six teachers on a school trip from St James' Primary School in Shrewsbury. Swiss police said the crash happened at noon British time today, about thirty miles from Zürich. Officials said eight of the children have been taken to hospital with minor injuries.

Story 3:

In the last hour, Theresa May has said that the UK will take in fifty thousand more Azbikistan refugees in response to the worsening humanitarian crisis. A further £100m in humanitarian aid for those in camps in Turkey, Jordan and Lebanon was also announced by the prime minister. Last week she said that letting more refugees into the UK was not the answer. She is expected to fly to Brussels tonight for talks with EU leaders to try and find a solution to the crisis. So far eleven million Azbikistanis have been displaced from their homes.

Story 4:

TV presenter Alice Temple has had a baby girl. She tweeted the news this morning, revealing the baby's name as Iris May. Temple also said she and her musician husband Jack Smith were delighted to be parents.

Story 5:

One of the UK's best loved soaps is to be cancelled after 50 years. *Glenside Row* will finish in December. Channel 6 said it took the decision because of declining ratings. Many of the UK's veteran actors including Peggy Lee started their careers on the soap. An online petition backed by Lee and other stars is calling for the show to continue and has so far attracted 200,000 signatures.

One hundred and fifty passengers and crew have escaped injury after a fire on an American Jets plane in Colorado. Officials said the left engine of the Boeing 777-200 caught fire just as the plane was coming in to land at Denver International Airport this morning. At least 30 people were taken to hospital with minor injuries.

Story 8:

Strong winds and heavy rain are continuing to cause severe disruption in England and Wales as a series of ferocious storms comes in from the Atlantic. In the past week, more than 30,000 homes and businesses in sout reac have this
